### *The First Thousand Years: A Global History of Christianity*

The Psalmist (Ps. 90:4) writes, "A thousand years in your eyes are merely a yesterday." But what does a thousand years really look like? More specifically, what happened in the first thousand years of Christianity? Robert Wilken in his truly fascinating and engaging book, *The First Thousand Years: A Global History of Christianity* traces the growth of Christianity from the first communities in Jerusalem to the time of Charlemagne. The author paints his picture using a broad palette of information. The journey from the small community to a world religion is filled with triumphs and tragedies, heroes and villains.

Wilken begins his book by a brief summary of Jesus' life, ministry, execution, and the confusion that the disciples must have experienced when their leader was taken so swiftly away from them. The earliest written account of the Resurrection is presented in Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians (15:3-8). In another account, the Roman historian Tacitus, refers to the death of Jesus as a "temporary setback" for the early Christians. However, their encounters with the risen Jesus enabled them to put aside any setbacks and go forth and proclaim the message of Jesus.

The early Christian communities were small, diverse and scattered. The primary means of conversion was evangelization by the Apostles and disciples. During this period the populace would convert and eventually the rulers. As time passed, however, the situation was reversed, and the conversion of the ruler would be followed by the conversion of the people.

Initially, the Christian community was usually ignored by the emperors and rulers. The requirements of visiting the shrines on the required days or paying tribute to the gods could be ignored by the Christians without much notice when the number of Christians was far less than one-percent of the population. However, as the community grew to be around ten percent of the population, the persecutions began as Christians refused to worship at the temples and the emperors saw this as a threat to the general stability of the state.

The book follows the growth of Christianity and introduces us to many of the well known names and how they fit into the picture. Among many notables we meet Origen, Cyprian, Constantine, Julian, Ambrose, Theodosius, and Augustine. A few examples of the many councils we attend are: the Councils of Nicea, Chalcedon, and Constantinople and the

Controversies behind each. Empires and emperors rise and fall, and the split, both political and religious, between East and West begins and grows. Several chapters are presented that focus on the development of Christian music and architecture, the rise of the papacy, the church in Africa, Syria, the Middle East, and the Orient.

The rise of Islam and the problems it presented, and still presents, is covered in several chapters. The conquest of the Christian and non-Christian nations by the Islamic armies takes place in a relatively short time compared to how long it took the Christian message to spread and be accepted. The unsettling influence of Arabic writing, theology, and philosophy on the Christian inhabitants of conquered lands is starkly portrayed. The gradual increase of laws that are unfavorable to the practice of Christian worship leads to a great decline in the number of Christians. In the end, the author presents some discouraging information in that areas that were once wholly Christian are now wholly Islamic.

The final chapters of the book portray the rise of the empire of Charles the Great, Charlemagne, in Western Europe and the Slavic nations in Eastern Europe. I could only present just a small picture of what this book includes. For the most part, this book presents a very good overview of a thousand years of a complex and ever-changing religious, social, and political world. This book would make for an interesting study in a class or long term study group. - Harry Ford, OFS

### Franciscans Serving Peace Voluntary poverty serves and sustains true peace.

Wealth is often rooted in the injustice of exploitation of humanity and the earth. At the same time, when wealth is accumulated, there is the problem of its defense. In short, wealth is created out of inequality and because of inequality it provokes a defensive posture, willingness to go to war to defend one's wealth. If we don't have anything, there is nothing to defend. Or if we do have things, they are to be shared, not hoarded. Archaeological evidence has emerged from the Middle East that when houses were basically of the same size, peace prevailed. When there began to be a disparity in the size of people's houses, more evidence of social conflict and war emerges. The way of nonviolence is not only a way of responding to specific forms of violence. Rather, nonviolence is a holistic way of life that is truly a spiritual pursuit that affects the way we respond to God, to our neighbor, to ourselves, and to all of creation.
