IV. DECLINE IN THE QUALITY OF HUMAN LIFE AND THE BREAKDOWN OF SOCIETY

Paragraph 47 "Furthermore, when media and the digital world become omnipresent, their influence can stop people from learning how to live wisely, to think deeply and to love generously. In this context, the great sages of the past run the risk of going unheard amid the noise and distractions of an information overload. Efforts need to be made to help these media become sources of new cultural progress for humanity and not a threat to our deepest riches. True wisdom, as the fruit of self-examination, dialogue and generous encounter between persons, is not acquired by a mere accumulation of data which eventually leads to overload and confusion, a sort of mental pollution. Real relationships with others, with all the challenges they entail, now tend to be replaced by a type of internet communication which enables us to choose or eliminate relationships at whim, thus giving rise to a new type of contrived emotion which has more to do with devices and displays than with other people and with nature. Today's media do enable us to communicate and to share our knowledge and affections. Yet at times they also shield us from direct contact with the pain, the fears and the joys of others and the complexity of their personal experiences. For this reason, we should be concerned that, alongside the exciting possibilities offered by these media, a deep and melancholic dissatisfaction with interpersonal relations, or a harmful sense of isolation, can also arise.."



We are called to take care of others

We cannot lock ourselves in our private group. All are called to take care of our brothers and sisters, especially the most marginalized. Pope Francis affirms this in his Regina Coeli thoughts on Monday April 2, 2018, in St. Peter's Square. The Pontiff underlines that the common good and justice cannot be achieved without fraternity, because only through "fraternal sharing" can one realize "an authentic ecclesial or civil community". Otherwise, "there is only a set of individuals driven by their own interests".

It is "so important in our time to rediscover fraternity, just as it was lived in the early Christian communities". We must "rediscover how to give space to Jesus who never separates, always unites". Because there cannot be "a true communion and a commitment to the common good and social justice without fraternity and sharing. Without fraternal sharing, an authentic ecclesial or civil community cannot be created: there is only a group of individuals motivated by their own interests ".

Easter "explodes in the world the novelty of dialogue and relationship, something new that has become a responsibility for Christians".

Christ says: "From this everyone will know that you are my disciples: if you have love for one another". "We cannot confine ourselves in our private group, but we are called to take care of the common good, to take care of our brothers and sisters, especially the weakest and most marginalized ". Only fraternity can "guarantee lasting peace, can defeat poverty, can extinguish tensions and wars, can eradicate corruption and crime".

Take every opportunity to be witnesses of the peace of the risen Lord especially in regard to the most frail and disadvantaged ". (Vatican Insider - Domenico Agasso Jr).

A Prescription from St. Francis For Living a Good Life

From Reluctant Saint: the Life of Francis of Assisi, a new biography of St. Francis by Donald Spoto.

When questioned about the meaning of following in his footsteps, Francis referred to the last sections of the Rule he had drafted in 1220 and 1221 – the document rejected and diluted by the fraternity. The sense of his words is clear:

- God is the absolute good and must have priority in our lives.
- Our lives themselves manifest the praise of God.
- We give thanks for the beauty of the world.
- We long to believe fully in the triune God, Who created, redeemed, and will finally act in love to save us forever.
- We long to desire nothing but God, on Whom we depend and in Whom we hope.
- We want to love God because He has first loved us.
- Doing penance means constantly turning to God.
- We are poor because God alone is rich, and everything good belongs to Him. Therefore, we need not be concerned about ourselves, our honor, our earthly goals. We can abandon ourselves and leave ourselves open to Him Who gives us everything. He is not unfeeling or indifferent, but He constantly draws near to us, speaks to us, saves us.
- For all these reasons, we are also concerned for the well-being and salvation of all mankind.
- We prefer the celebration and the living out of our faith rather than disputing about it – hence we go among unbelievers and preach to others mostly by example.
- It would be difficult to find, then or now, a better outline for a good life.


