On another note, I am often asked, what does a Secular Franciscan do once professed? I often say, we offer our time and talents to church ministries as Lectors, Eucharistic Ministers, music services, working in soup kitchens and shelters etc.

Speaking of ministries, I want to share with you a ministry mentioned in the June issue of the "Assisi Newsletter":

Franciscans are at the forefront against trafficking of human beings and for climate protection in the United States. Franciscan voices are heard in the United States on "hot" issues: such as ecology, human rights, poverty and peace and justice. The Franciscan Action Network, (FAN), was born in Baltimore, a non-profit organization based in Washington. This organization is composed of Franciscan nuns, friars, Secular Franciscans, and others. In all there are about 150 people involved. A network inspired by St. Francis of Assisi, who wants to raise his voice on sensitive issues on which the Church over the coming decades will have a central role.

FAN is driven by active volunteers throughout the country, supported by a small staff that acts as a control room. Steering FAN is a national minister of the Secular Franciscans, three Franciscan nuns, five Franciscan friars (by several orders: Friars Minor, Friars Minor Conventual, Friars Minor Capuchin, Third Order Regular), and four lay people.

The project has managed to integrate some fifty Franciscan groups, while Catholics make up a majority of the network, inside there are also members of inspiration Lutheran, ecumenical and non-Catholic Franciscan groups.

FAN promotes the positions of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, including advocacy for immigration reform and a path to citizenship for undocumented immigrants, legislation to reduce greenhouse gases and mitigate climate change, and economic policies to help the middle and lower class. FAN also maintains a stance on "pro-life" and its members participate in the annual March for Life in Washington.

On the immigration front, following the teachings of St. Francis of Assisi, FAN directs a significant part of its efforts to promote immigration reform, arguing that immigrants should be able to obtain citizenship and that there are political families ready to support its future as an active citizen in the United States.

In terms of climate change there is an activity for the organization to avert global warming. Currently there are vigils, seminars, meetings organized between all the networks in the United States, in view of the expected arrival of Pope Francis on the 24th of September. - Gelsomino Del Guercio – Assisi Newsletter

As you can see these are issues that need to be addressed not only by Pope Francis, Religious and Secular Franciscans, but by all of God’s people. Let us first begin by praying for peace and justice in our world and second, to get involved with organizations that will create this peace and justice for all.

so I hid myself" (Gn 3:8-10).

An incident came to my mind. When I was 4 or 5 years old, all my siblings were in school. My mother was busy at her sewing machine. I was playing with her yardstick, trying to wedge it in a doorway. She told me if I try to force it, it will break. What do mothers know? And then it broke! I ran to the back of a closet and hid. Amused rather than angry, she coaxed me out. No punishment.

We humans know the temptation of following our own plans, even when they are contrary to God's. We know better and have to try our way. If it creates a mess, shame can prompt us to try to hide our sin from God.

The profound truth is that we cannot hide from God. Psalm 139 expresses it movingly: "Where can I hide from your spirit? From your presence, where can I flee? If I ascend to the heavens, you are there; if I lie down in Sheol, you are there too. If I say, 'Surely darkness shall hide me'. . . Darkness is not dark for you."

Why Run?

"God's very being is love" (Catechism of the Catholic Church). God is not a spy—a security camera capturing our every movement. "God does not abandon his creatures to themselves. At every moment, he upholds and sustains them in being" (CCC 301). His love is like the warming sun. We are embraced by it. "In him we live and move and have our being," Paul reminds the Athenians.

The feasts of May and June are a "liturgical love feast," helping us appreciate this personal and pervasive love of God.

On Pentecost, May 24, we received the Holy Spirit who pours the love of God into our hearts. In the Sacrament of Reconciliation, the priest prays: "God the Father of mercies, by the death and resurrection of his Son, has reconciled the world to himself, and sent the Holy Spirit among us for the forgiveness of sins."

The following Sunday, we celebrated the Blessed Trinity. "God himself is an eternal exchange of love, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, and he has destined us to share in that exchange" (CCC 221).

The feast of the Body and Blood of Christ, June 7, celebrates the real, personal presence of Christ with us in the Eucharist. Out of love, he gave us the gift of himself. He is always available, ready to listen, to support. Why run away?

June 12 is the feast of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. In the revelations to St. Margaret Mary Alacoque, Jesus promised, "Sinners shall find in My Heart the source of an infinite ocean of mercy. I will console them in all their troubles." Who needs to hide?

The Paradox of Holiness

It is understandable that most people struggle with the desire to be holy. And that struggle exists because of a misunderstanding of what holiness really is. The best way to understand holiness is to think of this basic fact: holiness is our relationship with God. In other words, we can't make ourselves holy. Holiness is really a sharing in God's holiness *within* us. We need to seek God's will in all things. Obviously, none of us can do that perfectly. We are born wounded. God knows this. That's why Jesus gave his life for us in love.

We must be open to God working within. And then we grow in holiness! Your next question might be, "But how do I know that I am growing in holiness?" The answer is this: most people won't know. In fact, if someone is always looking for signs of holiness in himself or herself, he or she will be sorely disappointed. The fact is that saints never knew they were saints. They thought of themselves as great sinners. Read any autobiography of a saint and you will find that theme frequently in their writings.

Growth in holiness will not be felt. Holiness is a result of struggle, hard work, and dedication to what the Gospels ask us to do. Sometimes there is more blood, sweat, and tears than any wonderful, ecstatic experiences. This means that our journey through life is indeed a life of faith.

Grace of God

Just look around you and within the circumstances of your life. You will find the path to holiness, though at times it may feel more like a struggle.

What is essential to understand is that God is with us. The Spirit is always leading us, inspiring us, and enlightening us. Jesus, our Lord, is always leading us along the way. Husbands and wives, mothers and dads: they all find holiness in their vocation. I, as a Franciscan priest, find it within the circumstances of my calling. It may look as though I have some special graces that others do not. But that is not true. God gives each person the specific grace needed for his or her life.

In the end, that will be part of the revelation of eternity—a never-ending, mind-blowing understanding of our earthly journey with God revealing every graceful detail of our journey with him. It should be utterly wonderful.



ST. FRANCIS AND THE EUCHARIST

We have two versions of St. Francis' "Exhortation to the Clergy." The earlier text was probably written before 1219; the other text dates from 1220. The first version reflects the concerns of the Fourth Lateran Council in 1215 that all priests show more reverence for the Eucharist, especially by making sure that churches are kept clean and that altar linens and vessels are worthy of the body and blood of Jesus in the Eucharist. Proper care is also needed for books containing the Scriptures.

The second version of Francis' text shows the influence of a decree that Pope Honorius III issued on November 22, 1219, urging greater attention to the cleanliness of churches, reserving the Eucharist in a worthy and secure place, and teaching their people to bow when the consecrated host is elevated during Mass.

The bishops at the Fourth Lateran Council felt the need to require Catholics to receive the Eucharist at least once a year and to confess mortal sins at least yearly. Francis of Assisi did his best to encourage reverence for the Eucharist. May we follow his example.

What does it mean for Secular Franciscans "to observe the gospel"?

Above all it means to know God as Father, to have Jesus Christ as the inspiration, model, and criterion of our every action, and to allow ourselves to be guided by the Spirit of the Lord. It also means to realize in our apostolates the love of others in a spirit of service; to work in a context proper to our secular state, witnessing a life of penance as continual conversion to the gospel; to realize a universal fraternity in Christ; to dedicate ourselves to the works of mercy, to the promotion of justice and peace, and to the safeguarding of creation.
