## ACTING MINISTER'S MESSAGE

Hello everyone. May the Peace of Christ be with you.

Due to the recent escalation of the sex scandal within the Church, I feel that subject needs to be addressed and what we as Franciscans can do about it.

Recently two messages from our Regional Minister, Bob Longo, were received and forwarded to our fraternity membership that contain excellent ways in which we can respond to this crisis. One is from our National Minister, Jan Parker, and the other is a short video from Bishop Robert Barron, "Why Remain Catholic" (<http://saintmargaretof cortona.org/videos/>). I encourage you to save and frequently review these messages.

Jan tells us that we should face the truth of the matter and not make excuses for those who are guilty. We need to listen to those who feel abandoned and betrayed by the Church hierarchy; not just the victims but all who are hurting. Listen to them without judging or trying to immediately heal. We need to accept them all as a gift of the Lord and an image of Christ as Article 13 of our Rule tells us. We need to support the vast number of our brothers and sisters who are faithfully serving the Church but have become "guilty by association" due to this tragedy.

We as Franciscans have an excellent opportunity to follow in the footsteps of our founder and rebuild the Church as he did. Bishop Barron's video "Why Remain Catholic" gives us several ways to do that.

Many people have left the Church over the years for any number of reasons and more are now because of this scandal. Instead of running away, Bishop Barron exhorts us to fight for the Church we believe in and set things right. We need to speak out, write letters, organize our fellow Catholics, make people accountable, and attend Mass, not stay away!

Remember, we are to be out in the world, standing out from the crowd, and doing what we can to make a difference. We are told to preach the Gospel at all times and use words when necessary. Now, words as well as actions are necessary.

Even though many of our leaders have failed and betrayed us, the Church still stands. The late Venerable Archbishop Fulton Sheen spoke of four periods within the history of the Church when things looked bleak. The first was at the fall of the Roman Empire when Barbarians overran Europe. The second was in 1054 when the Eastern and Western Churches split. The third began in 1517 with the Protestant Reformation, and the fourth in recent decades.

Following the first three periods, the Church rebounded and flourished. Matthew 16 tells us that the "Gates of Hell shall not prevail against it". So, with faith, I have no doubt that in time, the Church will rebound and once again become the Light of the World.

Take heart and let's get to work!

## Laudato Si (Praise be to you – On Care For Our Common Home),

### IV. DECLINE IN THE QUALITY OF HUMAN LIFE AND THE BREAK-DOWN OF SOCIETY

Paragraph 49 “It needs to be said that, generally speaking, there is little in the way of clear awareness of problems which especially affect the excluded. Yet they are the majority of the planet’s population, billions of people. These days, they are mentioned in international political and economic discussions, but one often has the impression that their problems are brought up as an afterthought, a question which gets added almost out of duty or in a tangential way, if not treated merely as collateral damage. Indeed, when all is said and done, they frequently remain at the bottom of the pile. This is due partly to the fact that many professionals, opinion makers, communications media and centers of power, being located in affluent urban areas, are far removed from the poor, with little direct contact with their problems. They live and reason from the comfortable position of a high level of development and a quality of life well beyond the reach of the majority of the world’s population. This lack of physical contact and encounter, encouraged at times by the disintegration of our cities, can lead to a numbing of conscience and to tendentious analyses which neglect parts of reality. At times this attitude exists side by side with a “green” rhetoric. Today, however, we have to realize that a true ecological approach *always* becomes a social approach; it must integrate questions of justice in debates on the environment, so as to hear *both the cry of the earth and the cry of the poor.*”

"We follow Saint Francis as an example par excellence of care for what is weak and of an integral ecology, lived with joy and authenticity. Pope Francis, after spreading his message for the World Day for Creation established by him, still emphasizes: "Each of us has a responsibility for others and for the future of our planet. Similarly, the economy must serve man, not exploit it and rob it of its resources. Today we are called to make use of the possibilities that technology makes available to us, with a good use of resources, helping in particular the countries most affected by poverty and degradation to take the path of renewal and sustainable and integral development".



**December 8, 2000**

**The Form of Life  
Article 14**

2. Rule 8. The Eucharist is the center of the life of the Church. Christ unites us to himself and to one another as a single body in it. Therefore, the Eucharist should be the center of the life of the fraternity. The brothers and sisters should participate in the Eucharist as frequently as possible, being mindful of the respect and love shown by Francis, who, in the Eucharist, lived all the mysteries of the life of Christ.
