If you closely pay attention to the readings of Advent up until the 17th of December then you might ask yourself what is going on here. These first-half readings do not seem to have much about the upcoming Christmas, and that is so. We in the Church are celebrating two comings of which Christmas is the latter for us. We most certainly celebrate this great feast later this month, but right now we are concentrating another celebration of hope: the second coming. The Father did not just send his Son once, but He will send Him again, a



second time. That is why we hear readings of the yet to be future coming. It is the one we anticipate now when God will take all of his followers with him everlastingly in heaven.

I would say that it is from our faith in God and His Word that we know that it is our hope of this most certain hope of God's future promise being fulfilled and our joining him in Heaven. Dear sisters and brothers in Francis and Clare, I write to you in this most beautiful and profound of seasons. Come Lord Jesus! You may be familiar with this piece from Meister Eckart (sermons 1-3). I recently read it again and always am moved by his words:

DIVINE BIRTH IN THE SOUL There is a huge silence

inside each of us that beckons us into itself, and the recovery of our own silence can begin to teach us the language of heaven.

What good is it to me that Mary gave birth to the son of God fourteen hundred years ago if I do not also give birth to the Son of God?

We are all meant to be mothers of God, for God is always needing to be born, Cherish in yourself the birth of God In this Birth, you partake in the divine stream, Christ is conceived in your core, your inmost recess, where no idea ever glowed.

In this Birth, God pours into you, and the light at the core of your soul grows so strong, it spills out. The light overflows into your body, which becomes radiant with it.

For the eternal Birth, which occurred at one point in time, occurs every day in the inmost core of the soul"

This is a prayerful time of waiting and expectation. One of our sisters, Louise Hotovy, shared a very simple but effective way to practice this mindfulness. She suggests placing an

alarm on our phones in the middle of each morning and each afternoon with a label "time to pray" or something similar. It works! Each day I am reminded to whisper a prayer of love and trust to the God who created us. What could be better?!



Sermon of St. Fulgentius on the Feast of St. Stephen

(The Second Reading of the Office of Readings on the 26th of December)

Yesterday we celebrated the birth in time of our eternal King. Today we celebrate the triumphant suffering of his soldier. Yesterday our king, clothed in his robe of flesh, left his place in the virgin's womb and graciously visited the world. Today his soldier leaves the tabernacle of his body and goes triumphantly to heaven.

Our king, despite his exalted majesty, came in humility for our sake; yet he did not come empty-handed. He brought his soldiers a great gift that not only enriched them but also made them unconquerable in battle, for it was the gift of love, which was to bring men to share in his divinity. He gave of his bounty, yet without any loss to himself. In a marvelous way he changed into wealth the poverty of his faithful followers while remaining in full possession of his own inexhaustible riches.

And so the love that brought Christ from heaven to earth raised Stephen from earth to heaven; shown first in the king, it later shone forth in his soldier. Love was Stephen's weapon by which he gained every battle, and so won the crown signified by his name. His love of God kept him from yielding to the ferocious mob; his love for his neighbor made him pray for those who were stoning him. Love inspired him to reprove those who erred, to make them amend; love led him to pray for those who stoned him, to save them from punishment. Strengthened by the power of his love, he overcame the raging cruelty of Saul and won his persecutor on earth as his companion in heaven. In his holy and tireless love he longed to gain by prayer those whom he could not convert by admonition.

Now at last, Paul rejoices with Stephen, with Stephen he delights in the glory of Christ, with Stephen he exalts, with Stephen he reigns. Stephen went first, slain by the stones thrown by Paul, but Paul followed after, helped by the prayer of Stephen. This, surely, is the true life, my brothers, a life in which Paul feels no shame because of Stephen's death, and Stephen delights in Paul's companionship, for love fills them both with joy. It was Steohen's love that prevailed over the cruelty of the mob, and it was Paul's love that covered the multitude of his sins; it was love that won for both of them the kingdom of heaven.

Love, indeed, is the source of all good things; it is an impregnable defense, and the way that leads to heaven. He who walks in love can neither go astray nor be afraid: love guides him, protects him, and brings him to his journey's end. My brothers, Christ made love the stairway that would enable all Christians to climb to heaven. Hold fast to it, therefore, in all sincerity, give one another practical proof of it, and by your progress in it, make your ascent together.

St. Fulgentius of Ruspe (462 or 467—527 or 533), bishop of the city of Ruspe, a Roman province of North Africa in modern-day Tunisia, staunchly & repeatedly defended the Church against Arian heresies.
