Greetings from Brother Lawrence

The wonderful month of October is my favorite month of the year. I took a trip to Weber's Produce in the Parkville area this morning: tractor rides for the lads and lasses; pumpkins, some small and some huge up for sale; and cider donuts. It is just a perfect atmosphere for October; I love it. We need to look for the good things in life and not overlook them. Our busy world, especially during the week is filled with much that is good and some that is not and it should be our goal to find the good and celebrate it. That's what I went to Weber's for this morning. I remember it from when I was just a lad growing up in Parkville. Mom and Dad would put the six of us in the car and take us to Weber's for the fall festivities (which always ended with the cider donuts); it was a good day all rolled into one simple morning. These little remembrances are good ones and ones that we need to remember always. There are others but this I am writing about this one because of my visiting there again this morning.

I realize that I should be writing about St. Anthony and his sermon on purifying our soul, but, with all respect due to St. Anthony, I cannot help but think that remembering good things from the past (and this morning's present) can also, in a way, help to purify one's soul. There is so much out in the world that does just the opposite to us, but a celebration of the good in one's life reminds us that our soul has much good accumulated within it as well. In my philosophy class we have been reading Plato's story of Socrates' death. Socrates was pressured by his friends to use the prison opportunity to escape his prison and his city and go to live elsewhere. Many of Socrates' friends had already bribed the guards and they knew that the authorities would not go looking for Socrates, they just wanted him gone. Socrates refused to flee. He thought that that would be a violation of the laws of Athens and that that would be a "sin" (my word, not his) on his soul. As the Council has left me, your beloved editor, to my own devices this month, I decided to explore how this wisdom of Saint Francis may be lived out in our very own day and age! Blessed Carlo Acutis of Assisi, Servant of God John Bradburne OFS, and Carol Seydel are all wonderful examples of how sanctifying ourselves may sanctify society. Let us begin again!

Blessed Carlo Acutis

While the newly beatified teen may have been born in London and raised in Milan, Carlo had a fondness for Assisi that went beyond the scenic vistas. Like Saint Francis, Blessed Carlo used a popular media form to spread the Good News. Saint Francis used his Canticles as a troubadour to sing of the beauty of his Love, the revelation of Christ in Creation; Blessed Carlo used the internet both for research and dissemination of information about his Love, the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist. In both cases, the young men used their personal dispositions and resources in the service of Christ.

How do we use our talents in the service of Him who we love? Often, it is others who see something in us and challenge us to new heights—this is where fraternity comes in. Use this time of isolation to reach out to your brothers and sisters and see what they have to say!

He believed that that would be more harmful to him than any apparent good of fleeing the death penalty. What I am really addressing here is the idea that we must seek the purification of one's soul as St. Anthony said. Even a man who lived 400 years before Christ was aware of this much. Good makes the soul glow, if you will, so I am suggesting that we start accumulating the goods in our lives and avoid all the harmful things that are out there. Yes, the last parts of St. Anthony's homily stresses that those other Cana jars of water referring to almsgiving, fasting and forgiveness are also purifiers of the soul, I am just expanding the list to include some every day good that purify the soul as well. Enjoy this wonderful season of autumn before the leaves glowing in colors on the trees have gone away.




Lots of people enjoy donating "fun" items, but plenty of practical needs exist. Items needed include:

Carol Seydel and the Eucharistic Miracles

Right now, I imagine a few of you are thinking, “I am not young and I am not a songwriter or a computer programmer. I am off the hook.” Wrong. In my effort to find out more about Blessed Carlo Acutis’ Eucharistic Miracles program, I ended up on the TheRealPresence.org’s website. “Hmm,” I thought, “Isn’t this where I find all the great audio, video, and writings of Fr. John A. Hardon, S.J.?” Curious, I saw the phone number at the bottom of the page and called it.

I am not sure that Carol Seydel realized that, as she talked about how she became involved in the project, I heard more than the Eucharistic miracles that Carlo catalogued or even the miracles that God is still performing through Carlo. Back in 2005, Carol and friends were just beginning development of TheRealPresence.org when one of them saw a note on the internet asking for help with a project about the Eucharist. Through a series of events, Carlo’s mother, Antonia got in touch with Carol and the work began! All of Carlo’s work, you see, was in Italian and his mother asked Carol and the RealPresence.org to spearhead the translation into English and the dissemination of the project throughout the Americas and Canada. Carol reflects, “I was retired and doing nothing and out of nothing came something” and “you’re never bored when you’re with God.” To see the Carlo’s amazing research and bring it to your local parish, go to: http://www.therealpresence.org/eucharst/mir/engl_mir.htm .

P.S. There is no need to be retired and bored —and don’t try to claim that dying is an excuse! Just as with Saint Francis, much of young Carlo’s work was done while he was dying. 

So that we might more fully live the Gospel Life, Secular Franciscans should not just read *The Rule*, but reflect on, and pray with *The Rule*.

10. United themselves to the redemptive obedience of Jesus, who placed His will into the Father's hands, let them faithfully fulfill the duties proper to their various circumstances of life. Let them also follow the poor and crucified Christ, witness to Him even in difficulties and persecutions.

11. Trusting the Father, Christ chose for Himself and His mother a poor and humble life, even though He valued created things attentively and lovingly. Let the Secular Franciscans seek a proper spirit of detachment from temporal goods by simplifying their own material needs. Let them be mindful that according to the gospel they are stewards of the goods received for the benefit of God's children. Thus, in the spirit of the Beatitudes, and as pilgrims and strangers on their way to the home of the Father, they should strive to purify their hearts from every tendency and yearning for possession and power.

Servant of God, John Bradburne OFS

Recently, I began research into the International Secular Franciscan water project, Well4Africa; the current project is at Mutemwa Leprosy Catholic and Care Center and it is there that I met John. Of course, I didn't really travel to Africa or actually meet John, I found them both in books. Our brother in Francis and Clare, John Bradburne, OFS led a life much like Saint Francis himself.

Born in June of 1921, John found his way into the military and was sent to fight in WWII in Malaya; he was not a man of war and it was not a war for men. John suffered greatly, but did not often talk about this terrible time. Once he returned to England, John began a journey of seeking his vocation in monasteries, in journeys to the Holy Land, and eventually at mission centers in Rhodesia (now Zimbabwe). When a friend invited John to visit Mutemwa, he had no idea what the Lord had in store for him

When John arrived at Mutemwa, the lepers ran to get burlap sacks to cover their "ugly" selves with; I think that is the moment that John decided to abandon all his searching and seek God in the outcast—for these people were the lowliest of outcasts. Many were foreigners who had come seeking work, but were now sick, disfigured, handicapped, and unable to return home. John made them family and became their servant. He did whatever was needed and would not leave them, even in the midst of a civil war.

John's story did not end with his kidnapping by rebel youth. It did not end when those in charge refused to condemn him. It did not end when the youth assassinated him in the streets. It did not end when he was found after three days or with the signs at his funeral or the miracles since his death. In his memory, those at Mutemwa are setting up to be not only self-sufficient, but to provide fresh food to the community. To learn more & help out, go to:
