Acting Vice Minister:
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There were about ten of us in the beginning, our founder and foundress were Jean and Jim Manning; they came from another fraternity in Baltimore and Mike Eich introduced us to a young priest from St Michael the Archangel Fraternity. In the beginning, the local fraternities were very connected, whenever The Little Flower or St. Michael's fraternity did something, they always let us know so we could all do it together. For a while we met at St. Mark's in Catonsville, then at Our Lady's Center in Ellicott City before finally moving to the St. Joseph Cupertino Friary.

Jean shared a lot of stories with me: tales of a Eucharistic Procession that met with an unexpected turn, a dance that broke out during a silent retreat, and even a surprising, yet joyful feeding of hungry friars. Some common threads quickly emerge – Eucharist, fraternity, joy, servant leadership, service to others, Our Lady, and a sense of adventure. Full of thanksgiving, Jean let me know that she has not been forgotten. She still receives Mass cards, a very beautiful prayer shawl, cards, calls, visits, and many prayers from fraternity members.

As we look back on forty years of Franciscan fraternity, even a candidate like myself can see the joy that Francis felt as he declared, "After the Lord gave me brothers and companions, no one showed me what I ought to do, but the Most High Himself revealed to me that I ought to live according to the pattern of the Holy Gospel." Traditionally we had a Christmas party for the December gathering, but we are not able to do the party this year. However, while we see each other on computer or cell phone screens, we may still have many things to share with each other, reflecting what has happened to each of us this year and how much thanks we would give to the Lord and to our families, friends, and our sisters and brothers. In particular, this December is the 40th anniversary of our fraternity. We have around ten members who have been professed more than two decades. We may listen to them how they have done through decades and also some memorable stories.

Advent is the beginning of Jesus' life story in this world. When I read what angel Gabriel says, "of his kingdom there will be no end," (*NRSV:CE*, Luke 1:33) however, my mind is suddenly flying over time to the scene at the end of the Messiah's life in this world, saying "Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in Paradise." (Luke 23:43) As we know, it's the words that the crucified Jesus said to one of the criminals, responding to the criminal's repentance. Two men hanging on trees are paradoxically talking about Paradise, the Kingdom. In fact, it is the Way for entering the Kingdom we are hoping for, and eventually Jesus's passion and resurrection are the reason that we are joyful in the Christmas season. The Lord shows us the Way which we have never expected, but also encourages us to believe "For nothing will be impossible with God." (Luke 1:37) I am wondering if the Blessed Virgin Mary knew this when she heard the words from angel Gabriel. But one thing I am sure of is that Mary was confident enough to say "Surely, from now on all generations will call me blessed." (Luke 1:48) Am I confident in the Lord like Blessed Mary at her young age? The confidence has not come from her knowledge, but came from her purity in the heart, which may be well expressed in these passages:

Tell me, you whom my soul loves, where you pasture your flock, where you make it lie down at noon; for why should I be like one who is veiled beside the flocks of your companions?

If you do not know, O fairest among women, follow the tracks of the flock, and pasture your kids beside the shepherds' tents. (Song of Songs 1:7-8)

15. Let them individually and collectively be in the forefront in promoting justice by the testimony of their human lives and their courageous initiatives. Especially in the field of public life, they should make definite choices in harmony with their faith.

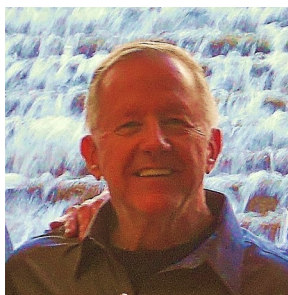

In May 2001, he made a decision to put into practice the commitment made in his 1996 profession, when asked, “Do you wish to be faithful to this vocation and to practice the spirit of service proper to the Secular Franciscans?” In May 2001 he was elected the minister of our fraternity.

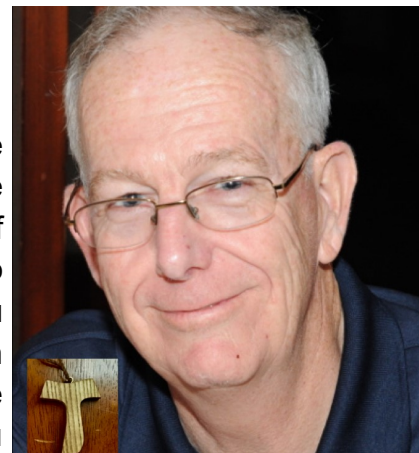
In May 2013, Bob once again made that commitment of service, as he was once again elected to serve as our fraternity minister and again in 2016. In April 2015, he went on to be elected Regional Councilor for the Washington Metro Area. In April 2018, he resigned as our fraternity minister, to become our current Regional Minister.

Bob is quoted as saying, “it has been a joy to have had the privilege to serve both on our fraternity council and on the regional council and to have Francis and Clare as our model for what it means to be a servant leader in our Order.

and you will receive an email invitation at 12:45 on Saturday.

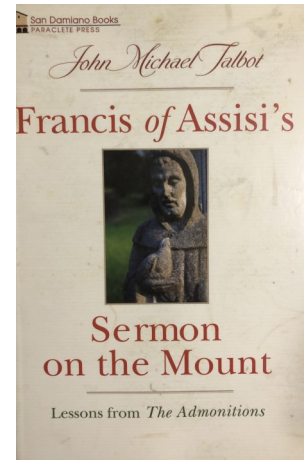

Sharing Our Journey Through the Book Share

Have you ever noticed that the Saint Joseph Cupertino Fraternity has a book *share* instead of a book club? As we started our new book this month, Jerry Yu OFS and Bob Longo OFS led us in a discussion of how we share our lives through the book we are reading rather than merely discuss a book. In his (and our) new book, *Francis of Assisi's Sermon on the Mount: Lessons from "The Admonitions,"* John Michael Talbot himself reinforces this idea. Each chapter begins with an Admonition of St. Francis, then Talbot shares his reaction to the Admonition and how it fit into his journey. Lastly, Talbot describes the challenges of the world & Church in both St. Francis' time and ours. This book neatly parallels our book share!

Our format is simple. Each month, we read one or two chapters on our own. Any available study guides simply help us explore the book on our own. On the first Saturday of the month, we gather in person or on Zoom and share what passages of the book spoke to us. Soon, everyone is sharing! I have learned so much about my brothers and sisters and Franciscan spirituality from the book share.
