Greetings from Brother Lawrence



As we all know the Holy Father has proclaimed this year to be the year of St. Joseph. It is in honor of being 150 years ago that Pius IX in his declaration *Quemadmodum Deus* where Joseph was proclaimed patron of the Church. I have, naturally, read Pope Francis' actual proclamation and I found myself intrigued by its title (in Latin of course) - *Patris corde* (with a father's heart).

St. Joseph was proclaimed "Patron of the Catholic Church" in times of worry and challenge to the Church by the rise of communism. (Interestingly enough he would later be given a second feast day on May 1 as St. Joseph the Worker, which was to demonstrate a true worker as opposed to the rising communist worker.)

The title interested me because I had never really come to think of St. Joseph as father, but as guardian. But he *was* the earthly father of Jesus and the beloving husband of Mary. I can see the Holy Father Francis asking us to consider Joseph to be our foster father as well. The heart of a father is a loving, caring and guiding one; it has made me think of the guidance that Joseph, with a father's loving heart, must have given to Jesus. Pope Pius IX and Pope Francis have offered St. Joseph to all the faithful as our loving father who will guide us just as he did Jesus. So, this year of St. Joseph is opening new doors from his loving heart and I pray that for many others as well we will ponder the things of God and be guided by the loving heart of St. Joseph.

Minister's Message

In last month's newsletter, Br. Lawrence wrote "The chief priests and the scribes call out that if Jesus can save Himself they will come to believe in Him. Yet, as we know, He is saved in the Resurrection and still the priests and scribes do not believe in Him. They have lost all hope along with the others and it is the Roman centurion who now lives in hope of a Resurrection with all of those who come to hear his proclamation."


While reading Br. Lawrence's meditations, I came to think that truly the Creator is creative. The high priests ridiculed Jesus, saying "save thy own self" (Mt 27:40), seeing the event only through human ways. They had not even tried to think differently that the Creator, our Father, might have a different plan. Their arrogance also proved that they did not believe "no word shall be impossible with God," (LK 1:37) though they might have recited Scripture everyday. Interestingly, it was the Roman centurion who tried to think differently. It is our faith that we trust in the Creator. "For my thoughts are not your thoughts: nor your ways my ways, saith the Lord. For as the heavens are exalted above the earth, so are my ways exalted above your ways, and my thoughts above your thoughts." (Isaiah 55:8-9)

For us, the Lord has granted enough grace to believe "no word shall be impossible with God." During the profession ceremony, the Lord encouraged us to confidently say "I, by the grace of God, renew my baptismal promises and consecrate myself to the service of his Kingdom …" In every Sunday Mass, we say "I believe in God, the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible …" In the April gathering, we renewed our Profession during Mass. In addition to the renewal of our Profession, how about taking time to meditate on the Creed in this Holy season, asking ourselves if we confidently believe every word recited in the Creed?

Marie was also a member of my parish (St. Louis in Clarksville) and she made several trips to our sister parish in Gonaeives, Haiti, to help after they had been devastated by a powerful hurricane. She gave of herself in this way several times thereafter.

A year or two later we both registered for a pilgrimage to Assisi with Father Noel, OFM (then administering the Shrine). Marie created such fun in our group! Assisi is very hilly; Marie insisted on wearing her high heels everywhere and took our teasing as generously as it was intended. On our return home, Marie hosted a gathering of all the pilgrims at her lovely home. It was a delight as we all compared photos and memories.



The few times I saw Marie at the Shrine over the last few years was always in the role of volunteer to assist where needed. Knowing Marie was such a true pleasure; she will be missed by many!




The Rule Review

So that we might more fully live the Gospel Life, Secular Franciscans should not just read *The Rule*, but reflect on and pray with *The Rule*.

- 5. Secular Franciscans, therefore, should seek to encounter the living and active person of Christ in their brothers and sisters, in Sacred Scripture, in the Church, and in liturgical activity. The faith of St. Francis, who often said, "I see nothing bodily of the Most High Son of God in this world except His most holy body and blood," should be the inspiration and pattern of their Eucharistic life.
- 6. They have been made living members of the Church by being buried and raised with Christ in baptism; they have been united more intimately with the Church by profession. Therefore, they should go forth as witnesses and instruments of her mission among all people, proclaiming Christ by their life and words. Called like Saint Francis to rebuild the Church and inspired by his example, let them devote themselves energetically to living in full communion with the

pope, bishops, and priests, fostering an open and trusting dialog of apostolic effectiveness and creativity.
