Even before Halloween had come, I saw stores and offices already decorated for Christmas. I have decided for myself that I would offer some reasons to let Christmas rest until late December and to actually emphasize November and what it brings.

It began for me in All Saints and All Souls days; the first a celebration of those before us whom we know are in heaven, and the latter a commemoration of those who have gone before us who have not yet been proclaimed to be saints. We continue to pray for these souls, many whom we have known, in hopes of their release from purgatory and heavenly entrance. Later in the month, we have All Saints of the Seraphic Order (11/29) and All Deceased of the Seraphic Order (11/5). Of course there are two upcoming secular commemorations that I do not want to forget, Veterans' Day and Thanksgiving Day. The first of these I see as a great big "thank you" to those, like myself, who spent time in the military (for me, the Navy) in protection of this country. We may not recognize them when we pass them on the street, but they have sacrificed their time to defend us and deserve our recognition. And, of course, Thanksgiving has become the biggest and most celebrated family holiday in the United States. We have to remember to be thankful to God, first and foremost, for all that he has done for us and for our country. Then comes our thankfulness for those people who help us in whatever way that they do: those who guide us, our teachers and students, our officemates, the cashiers at Royal Farms, etc.; these people often go forgotten at Thanksgiving. I need, this year, to remember to be more aware of everyone who has helped me in life.

Yes, November should not be forgotten or shrunken to a turkey dinner on just one day of the month. And, oh yes! I forgot to add one more celebration: November 28th is the "New Year's Day" for the Church as the First Sunday of Advent. Let us certainly remember to commemorate the Advent season for the those 27 days.

Regional Minister's Message

Holiday Message from the Regional Minister

As we enter into the season of celebrations, we have so much to be thankful for. Many families and friends will gather around the Thanksgiving table to relive memories of the past, talk about the present and plan for the future. Advent, Hanukah, Christmas and Kwanzaa, these are celebrations of joy. No matter the holiday, they all have one thing in common, they bring peace to the heart. Advent will be upon us before we know it. The season of Advent is a time for us to prepare our hearts for the coming of the baby Jesus. So, it is right and just to rend our hearts of the mundane and to joyfully and spiritually invite the King of Glory, the Prince of Peace to dwell within us.

In the small town of Greccio, of the province of Rieti in the Italian region of Lazio, at Christmastime in 1223, three years before his transitioning into eternal life, our brother Francis wished to celebrate the birth of Jesus in a new way by replicating that most beautiful night in his native Italy. To this day, you can see the stone used as the manger. Carved in the stone is a V-shaped indentation image where the babe was laid. Still at Christmas, in the town of Greccio, the traditional reenactment of the birth of Jesus can be found in the hearts of the visitors and townspeople.

Our holy father, St. Francis, is for us the perfect example of the indwelling of the King of Glory, the Prince of Peace. He shows us what it means to have Jesus living within us. In the First Life of Saint Francis, Thomas of Celano tells us of Brother Francis' experiencing the baby Jesus in the manger:

85. The Saint of God stood before the manger, full of sighs, overcome with tenderness and filled with wondrous joy.

86. The Saint of God was vested with Levitical ornaments, for he was a Levite, and with sonorous voice chanted the holy Gospel--an earnest, sweet, clear and loud-sounding voice; inviting all to the highest rewards. Then he preached to the people who stood around, and uttered mellifluous words concerning the birth of the poor King and the little town of Bethlehem. (And often, when he would name Christ Jesus, aglow with exceeding love he would call Him the Child of Bethlehem, and, uttering the word "Bethlehem" in the manner of a sheep bleating, he filled his mouth with the sound, but even more his whole self with the sweet affection. Moreover, in naming "the Child of Bethlehem" or "Jesus" he would, as it were, lick his lips, relishing with happy palate, and swallowing the sweetness of that word.) There the gifts of the Almighty were multiplied, and a vision of wondrous efficacy was seen

by a certain man; for in the manger, he saw a little child lying lifeless, to whom the Saint of God seemed to draw near and (as it were) to rouse the child from the lethargy of sleep. Nor was this vision incongruous; for the child Jesus had been given over to forgetfulness in the hearts of many in whom, by the working of His Grace, He was raised up again through His servant Francis and imprinted on a diligent memory.

At length the solemn vigil was ended, and each one returned with joy to his own place.

And so, with the passing of Advent and the coming of the celebration of the birth of our Lord, we too can be filled with the joy of Christ in our hearts. Just as St. Francis experienced the joy of the sacred birth at Greccio, along with the visitors and the townspeople about 800 years ago, so can we rejoice in this miracle in our hearts—not just at Christmas time but throughout the year as well.

In our service to each other let us experience this time of JUBILEE!



In Flemish 17th-century painting, elaborate garlands of sensuous, fragile blossoms at the height of their beauty and fruit ripe to the point of bursting—all inviting our touch before their inevitable decay—were often depicted framing spiritually significant images. Here garlands frame and complement a still life of objects underlining the brevity of human life: a skull, a burning candle, and an hourglass. The human skull had long been a subject for Flemish painters, as in St. Jerome Meditating on a Skull from the workshop of Pieter Coecke van Aelst; indeed many devout Christians in the 1600s kept a human skull for their own devotions, as the Human Skull in the Collector's Study. The combination of a skull with the candle and hourglass encourages a meditation on the miracle of Christ's Resurrection and its promise of eternal life to the faithful. Obviously the skull was too much for one past owner, as it was painted out at some point in the past, only to be revealed in 1988 through technical examination and cleaning. Along with fruits and flowers including roses, grapes, cherries, and thistles, as well as butterflies and a beetle, Van Son has included an ear of corn, a New World addition to the European diet. Van Son was baptized in Antwerp on September 24, 1623. The layout in [this piece] can be compared to a much smaller painting attributed to the artist in the Museum Boijmans Van Beuningen, Rotterdam. In that painting the niche contains a roemer (style of drinking goblet) of wine thus referencing the Christian Eucharist. ~courtesy of The Walters
