We ourselves, I would imagine, rarely think of accomplishing a task God asks of us perfectly and, perhaps, then wonder what will happen to us and God's reward of resurrection and eternal life from our imperfectness. Let us hope that we come to realize that we need only to do our best in what is asked of us and we shall receive blessings and reward from the Father.

At this time of year, I often meditate on Jesus as the one who fulfills the Father's will perfectly as only He, perhaps, can. I sometimes end up a little down at first, because Jesus does everything that the Father asked totally, perfectly, while I know that I can only achieve giving my best effort and hope that it is sufficient. Then I remember that hope is a theological virtue and that is a reward from God.

So as we go through another Triduum and Easter, we may come to see the virtue of hope coming to us in love from God and realizing that we are each doing the best we can with God's help of grace. For it is not really we who have the power to do perfectly what God asks of us, but God, through the blessing of His grace, that accomplishes the task for us.

Minister's Note April 2023

On Easter Sunday when I was eight, our family received a phone call that my nine-year-old cousin had been killed while crossing the road in front of his house.

All it took was a telephone call for our family to rush to gather at my grandparents' home to mourn his loss. While some of my family lived nearby, others had to travel to the town where my cousin died. My family lived four hours away. It was dark when we arrived at my grandparents' home. We entered the home usually filled with laughter and joy, but now in the throes of agony. In the days that followed, my parents took my sister and myself to the funeral home. We touched my cousin's hands and wept, and mourned what could have been. We gathered with everyone to bear witness to his young life and as he was buried.

I imagine that as the word spread that Jesus had been crucified, his distant relatives and friends also rushed to gather at his beloved Mother's home. Like my own family, they needed to be together with those who knew Him.

The first few days must have been one of great concern and speculation. Were they in danger of being crucified as well? Like my family that was gathered for my cousin, Jesus's family and followers must have been in the throes of agony. Can you imagine the surprise of those gathered when they hear that the tomb was empty? Where was He? What did Peter, John and Mary really witness that morning?

Later that evening He appears and wishes them Peace and breaths the Holy Spirit on them. Not everyone who knew Him had arrived yet. It would have taken my family at least three days to get to my grandparents' home if we had walked. It would be another week before Thomas witnesses Jesus's wounds and other miracles.

Here in the weeks after Easter more than 2000 years later, are we still rushing to the tomb? Are we gathering with family and friends to remember Him? What does it mean for us? How do we bear witness to His life? Are we like Thomas? Do we need to touch His hands and feet in order to believe? Scripture tells us that the disciples were both afraid and filled with joy after they see Him. Are we more afraid than joyful?

Easter Joy just doesn't come to us. We must seek it. We must rush to Him and know that Jesus is there intimately breathing on us, filling us with the Holy Spirit. We must believe that God transforms our mourning into laughter and joy. That even though we are apart, we will be one day be reunited with those who have passed away. Easter Joy means that we bear testament to Jesus's life with our lives by sharing the Joy of the Resurrection. Jesus told the women, "Do not be afraid. Go and share the good news."

Easter Joy means that we can run to tell others of His great Love and bring Peace to others. Easter Joy means that we share what has happened to those still arriving. Easter Joy means that we teach everything that Jesus has commanded us, and that we know He is with us until the end of the age. We are Easter people. May His Peace and Goodness and Love overwhelm you, and strengthen us as we bear witness to His abundant life. ~Peace, Melissa



Concerning those who do not do penance... ¹⁶And every talent, ability, knowledge and wisdom (2 Chr 1:12) they think they have will be taken away from them (Lk 8:18, Mk 4:25). ¹⁷And they leave their wealth to their relatives and friends who take and divide it afterward say: "May his soul be cursed because he could have given us more and acquired more than what he distributed to us." ¹⁸Worms eat his body and so body and soul perish in this brief world and they will go to hell where they will be tortured forever.
